

Key Facts

- Most towns in France still have specialist individual shops, but as in the UK, people will also do a lot of their shopping at Supermarkets.
- Traditionally, the French shopping week is from Monday to Saturday, however, some larger towns will have Supermarkets that open on Sunday mornings. Smaller shops will close over lunchtime.
- Bakeries (la boulangerie) often stay open at the start of the midday break, and close typically from Ipm to 3pm. Most people like to have their bread freshly baked and will go to the shop to buy bread twice a day.
- Many towns hold a market once or twice a week. People like to buy their fresh produce here, such as meat, cheeses, fruit and vegetables. Markets start setting up from about 7am and are usually packing away around Ipm.
- Going shopping is a social occasion. People working in shops know the locals well, and both workers and shoppers spend time asking how each other is. Generally, there is a lack of haste, especially in smaller shops and towns/villages.

Challenges

- Collect empty boxes/containers of food items. Price in euros the cost for the items (use an online currency converter). Set up a role play area and teach younger children the basic phrases for going shopping.
