




	Timeline of Key Events
793	 Raids of monasteries, including Lindisfarne
865	 Great Viking army from Denmark invaded England
866	 Danes captured York (which the Vikings called Jorvik) and made it their kingdom
876	 Vikings from Denmark, Norway amd Sweden settled permanently in England
886	 King Alfred 'the Great' defeated the Vikings but allowed them to settle in Eastern England
	 Beginning of Danelaw
927	 The kingdoms of England were united by King Athelstan
	Wessex ruled the other kingdoms
954	 Eric Bloodaxe, Viking ruler of Northumbria, was expelled from Jorvik Whole of England under Anglo-Saxon control
991	 King Athelred ('the unready') paid the first Danegeld ransom to stop Danish (Viking) attacks on England
1013	The Danes conquered EnglandAthelred fled to Normandy
1016	 Dane, King Cnut — became King of England
1042	Saxon, Edward to Confessor became king
1066	Edward the Confessor diedBattle of Stamford BridgeBattle of Hastings
