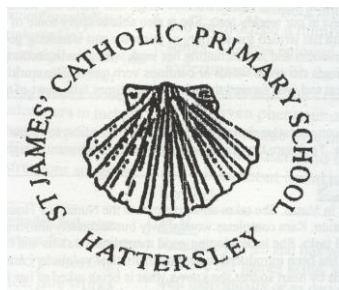

Warn and Inform

Dear Parent/ Carer,

We have been advised by Tameside Council's Public Health Team that there has been a confirmed case of COVID-19 within Year 2 at our school.

In line with the national guidance, children aged under 18 years are no longer required to self-isolate if they are a close contact of someone who has tested positive for COVID-19.

Your child and other members of your household can continue normal activities provided your child does not develop symptoms.

Your child may have been in contact with the positive case. People who have been in contact with someone who has tested positive with COVID-19 are advised to do daily lateral flow tests at home for the next 7 days.

Children who are aged under 5 years old who are identified as **close contacts** are not required to complete daily lateral flow tests and also do not need to self-isolate.

Please go to www.gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests to order tests online. These come in boxes of 7. They are also available to collect at local pharmacies.

Children and young people aged under 18 years 6 months and fully vaccinated staff who usually attend an education or childcare setting and who have been identified as a close contact are strongly advised to take a daily LFD before leaving the house for the first time that day and can then attend the setting as normal.

Please note people should not need to be re-tested via a PCR test within 90 days of a previous confirmed positive test, unless new symptoms develop, in which case they should book a PCR. Those who have had a confirmed case within 90 days can participate in LFD testing.

What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID-19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, they must isolate and you should arrange a test for your child via <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-getting-tested> or by calling 119.

If the test result is positive, your child will be required to self-isolate for a period of 10 days from the day that their symptoms started. Please inform us if your child has a positive test result.

If your child's test result is negative, they can continue with their normal activities if they are well enough to do so.

Symptoms of COVID-19

If you or someone in your household develops symptoms of Covid-19, isolate and access a PCR test. The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are recent onset of:

- new continuous cough and/or;
- high temperature and/or;
- a loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia).

However, people frequently present with a wider range of symptoms. If you or your child feel newly unwell with Covid-19 symptoms, then please access a PCR test. For many people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting COVID-19:

- wear face coverings in crowd places, especially when you are indoors;
- if someone in your household test positive, it is encourage that household contacts obtain a PCR test and test daily using LFD tests, unless exempt;
- wash your hands with soap and water often – do this for at least 20 seconds;
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available;
- wash your hands as soon as you get home;
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze;
- allow ventilation in the house through opening windows;
- put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards.

Test and Trace Support Payments

If a person is asked to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace and is on a low income, unable to work from home and will lose income as a result, they may be entitled to a payment of £500 from their local authority under the Test and Trace Support Payment scheme. This now applies to parents/ carers who cannot work from home and will lose income by self-isolating or staying at home to care for the child.
